**HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE:**

This one-story frame structure located at 902 S. Glendale Avenue was built around 1900. It first served at the turn of the century as the meeting place for the N.P. Banks Post of the local chapter of the G.A.R. (Civil War Veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic). In 1906 the building was used to house victims of the San Francisco earthquake who traveled south to escape the destruction left in the quake's aftermath.

More recently, the structure has served for a number of years as a meeting place for the local chapter of the Disabled American Veterans, as well as many other veterans' groups.
